DISTRICT RECOGNITION **Gaurav 2026: District Awards**

On 26th July, District 3131 held Gaurav 2026, its Annual Awards Ceremony for RY 2025-26, celebrating the outstanding work of clubs and Rotarians across the district through the year. It was a proud evening for RCPC, which came away honoured with multiple district awards, recognition of a year of collective effort across community service, membership growth, impactful projects, Foundation giving, youth service and club excellence.

The awards received by the club were:

- Highest Contribution to The Rotary Foundation, Rank 2 in the district
- Top Performing Club in Membership
- RI Focus Area, Disease Prevention and Treatment, for our Cancer Care Project
- RI Focus Area, Water and Sanitation, for the Satara Dam Repair Project
- Innovative Medical Project, the Milk Expression Room at KEM Hospital
- Community Skill Development, the Junior Nursing Project
- Youth Service, for organising RYLA
- Seven Star Club

A special word of congratulations goes to PP Rtn. Uday Dharmadhikari, honoured as a Five Star Assistant Governor, and to IPP Rtn. Lekha Nair and her team. These awards belong to every member who gave their time and heart to the club's work this past year. To each of you, congratulations, and thank you.

SERVICE **Service in Action****Thalassemia Awareness Program at FIBE, Pune**

On 21st July, the Rotary Club of Pune Central conducted a Thalassemia Awareness Program at FIBE, Viman Nagar, an initiative of PP Rtn. Ravi Kapoor and PP Rtn. Sanjay Karwa, continuing the club's role as Lead Club in Rotary District 3131 for Thalassemia

awareness. Rtn. Ashish Goyal, a founder of FIBE and an RCPC member, facilitated the program for around eighty young professionals.

Dr. Nita Munshi, President of the Thalassaemia Society Pune Chapter, spoke on prevention through blood testing, genetic counselling and voluntary blood donation. The session was followed by blood sample collection, which drew an overwhelming response with 73 samples collected in all.

President Cmde. Parvin Malhotra closed the session, reminding the young audience how fortunate they were to have this awareness at such an age, and to be at a stage of life where they could donate blood. He reassured the room that the process takes only a few minutes and is neither painful nor complicated, and encouraged everyone present to consider becoming donors. PR Rtn. Shikha Mitra of the Rotary Club of Poona Downtown attended in support along with club members.

HPV Awareness and Vaccination Drive at Dasve Public School, Lavasa

Rtn. Reshma Sambare, Co-Director of the District Team for Cervical Cancer Prevention, led an HPV awareness session and vaccination drive on 24th July at Dasve Public School in Lavasa. Cervical cancer prevention through HPV vaccination is one of District 3131's thrust areas this year, and this drive is the first of a continuing effort from our club.

The morning began with the awareness session rather than the vaccines, and that order turned out to matter. Only eight girls had signed up beforehand. After the session at least ten more came forward, and thirteen were vaccinated by the end of the morning. Parents sat through the session alongside the students, which counts for a great deal in this work.

That gap between interest and consent is the real work ahead. There is still a good deal of misunderstanding about the vaccine, and parents continue to refuse vaccination for their children. Every year between eighty thousand and one lakh girls and women in India lose their lives to this cancer.

"No number is small enough to stop spreading this awareness, or to stop empowering girls and boys to prevent this cancer.

The school gave the team its full support, and our thanks go to Principal Mona Seth and her staff. The vaccines were donated by the Serum Institute, administered by INVC, and the related costs met from District funds. A second drive is planned at the same school in

August, along with students from Christ University. RCPC will carry this work forward through RY 2026-27 and beyond.

Life Skills for Site Children: Rtn. Minal Kering at Tara Mobile Creches

On Sunday, 26th July, Rtn. Minal Kering visited the Hinjewadi centre of Tara Mobile Creches Pune, continuing a year long series of life skills, mentoring and counselling sessions for the children there. Since 1980, TMCP has worked to give the children of construction workers a happy, safe and nurtured childhood, setting up its centres on the building sites themselves and running them for as long as the project lasts.

Rtn. Minal led a four-hour interactive session for children between twelve and sixteen. It opened with a recap of the previous session on problem solving, decision making and anger management, then turned to communication and active listening, covering verbal and non-verbal cues, body language, and the value of truly listening to and understanding another person. Rather than lecture, she kept the group engaged through game-based activities, story-led discussions, group theatre and reflective conversations around real scenarios.

The group work closed with a feedback circle, where the children spoke about what they had enjoyed, what they had learned, and what they would like done differently next time. The final hour was given to individual counselling, a quieter space in which each child could share their worries, say what was on their mind and ask the questions they carry, one to one with Rtn. Minal. It is patient, unglamorous work, and exactly the kind that stays with a child long after the site has moved on.

Tree Plantation Drive at Green Sunrise Hill, Perne



On 26th July, RCPC hosted a Tree Plantation Drive at Green Sunrise Hill Perne, Wagholi, together with five Zone 4 clubs, the Rotary Club of Poona, RCP Downtown, RC Camp, RCP Far East and RC Kalyani Nagar. A busload of RCPC members and their families set off early from the Turf Club, among them President Rtn. Cmde. Parvin Malhotra, PN Rtn. Vaishali Karwa and PP Rtn.

Sanjay Karwa, Rtn. Lt. Col. Julius and R'Ann Dr. Madhu Rocque, Rtn. Imran and R'Ann Salma with their son Ishan, Rtn. Jeevan Mahaldar, and PP Rtn. Dr. Anand Bhatia. The plantation began at 8:30 AM, and on RCPC's request volunteers from Cognizant Technology Solutions turned out in large numbers, some 150 people in all working the slopes, with almost forty Rotarians planting side by side.

Green Sunrise Hill is a community driven effort by the Green Hills Group to turn a dry, barren hill into a lush urban forest, building the trenches and doing the soil work that gives a young tree a fair chance of surviving on rocky ground. Sachin Tyagi of Green Sunrise Hill and his team kept the energy high all morning. The day took its shape from District 3131's Tree Plantation Campaign and the Protect Environment call, and the District Environment Team was represented by its Director, PP Rtn. Subodh Malpani, and Co-Director, PP Rtn. Sanjay Karwa.

The groundwork goes back to last year, when IPP Rtn. Lekha Nair, PN Rtn. Vaishali Karwa, Rtn. Jeevan Mahaldar and PP Rtn. Ravi Kapoor visited the site and chose a single catchment area as the club's focus. This July's drive carried that early work forward, with Green Sunrise Hill tending the saplings afterward so they have the best chance of taking root on the rocky slope.

There was warmth in the smaller moments too. Gajanan's two children made themselves the welcome party, pressing hot tea and glucose biscuits into every hand as the bus arrived, while at the other end of the years PP Rtn. Dr. Anand Bhatia, at 86, was out on the slope with everyone else, spirited and tireless. President Rtn. Shikha Mitra of RCP Downtown celebrated her birthday on the hillside, and when the group gathered for photographs the saplings called for their own word, so the smiles came not to the cries of CHEESE but to a united hearty cry of TREEEEES!

It was a modest but genuine start, and one that supports the year's call across the Rotary world, answering both the Protect Environment and Conserve Water thrusts under Create Lasting Impact, the 2026-27 presidential message of RI President Olayinka Babalola. Together we plant, together we nurture, and together we create lasting impact.

A Winning Partnership: BAFL Foundation Archery Tournament



The Pune District Archery Tournament was held on 19th July, organised by the BAFL Foundation and the TenX Archery Academy. RCPC has supported BAFL (Building Athletes for Life) for the last two years by providing archery equipment, a partnership begun and championed by Rtn. Shireesh Nadkar. The foundation trains students from underprivileged backgrounds at Avasara Academy and two schools run by Savitribai Phule Prashala.

The tournament drew 173 archers across five age categories, in Indian,

Recurve and Compound bow events. Among them was Shiva Naqvi, a student of Avasara Academy trained by BAFL, who won third place in the under fifteen category from a field of twenty two, a result RCPC's equipment partnership exists for.

A Rural Field of Dreams: RCPC's Julius Rocque and the Eram Sports Arena

Our Honorary Secretary, Rtn. Lt. Col. Julius Rocque, Retd., wears another hat well away from Pune, as Vice President of the Eram Educational and Welfare Trust at Koppam, Kerala, a role he has held since the trust's inception.

This month the trust, with Eram Holdings, inaugurated the Eram Sports Arena at the Eram Educational Campus in Palakkad where Rtn. Julius addressed the audience. This sports arena, the first multi-sport facility of international standard in a rural Indian village, is built around the theme Grassroots to Greatness. It offers acrylic courts for six sports, a nine hundred seat amphitheatre with professional floodlights, and a solar powered campus, and has partnered the Palakkad Olympic Association in support of Khelo India.

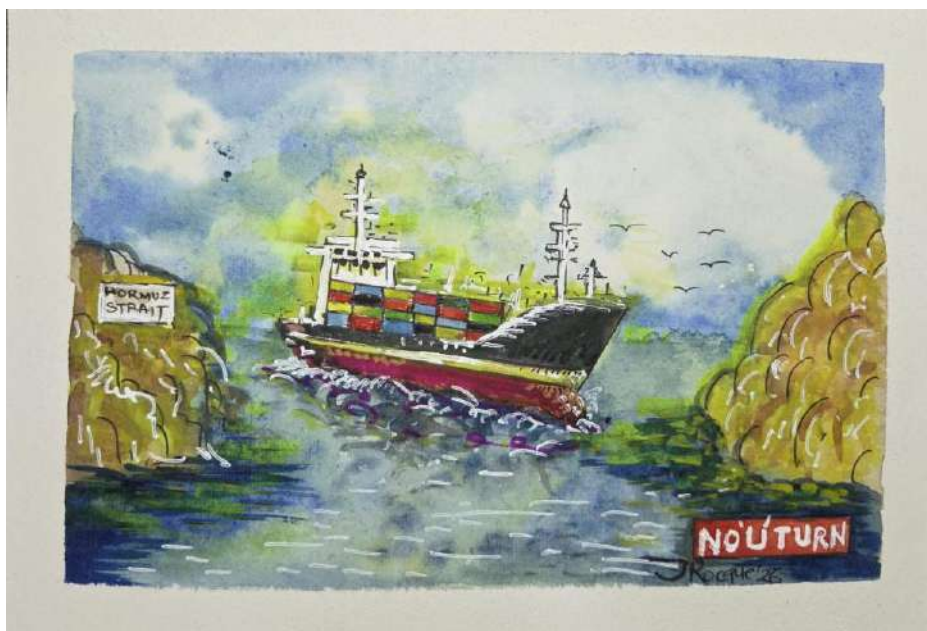

The Hands That Never Rested: A Daughter's Tribute at 90

Born in Jabalpur in 1936, my mother was a child of that decade, but circumstances forced her to become a breadwinner at a tender age. She cycled to work, did mountains of shorthand and typing, and took tuitions for the children in the neighbourhood. She was keen to study further, but had to stop after matriculation.

After marriage she moved to Bombay with my father. My brother and I came into their lives, but the shorthand and typing did not stop. She was one of the very few office-going mothers of her time. When I think of her hands, I remember them always at work: typing, making soft fluffy phulkas for us after a tiring day, grinding idli batter in the old-fashioned hand grinder, then settling down to knit, at top speed, sweaters for everyone in the family, no matter how distant.

Along with her job and the running of the home, she studied for a BA and then an MA in Literature in her forties, and took a computer course besides. To this day I have never

seen those hands take any rest. They are either sorting the flowers for pooja, or offering them to her deity, or writing a divine chant 108 times a day, or clutching a smartphone to bless and reassure her many nieces and nephews, and grandchildren over a video call. Her hands have defined her.

The other day, when I complained of stiff shoulders, it was her bony, frail hands that reached out to knead the ache away. This month she turns 90, and those hands have not stopped giving. I am so grateful to have these hands still holding me in their embrace.
